Please find enclosed our manuscript, entitled "Molecular Epidemiology of Female Lung Cancer," which we request you to consider for publication as a *Review Article* in *Cancers*.

Lung cancer is a leading cause of cancer mortality in the world, and the incidence of lung cancer in women has been increasing in recent decades. Furthermore, because the screening of lung cancer is not very effective as yet, clinically applicable molecular markers for early diagnosis are required. There appears to be a difference in characteristics of lung cancer between women and men, primarily in terms of histological types and susceptibility to environmental risk factors. However, due to the confounding effect of smoking and related factors, it is difficult to ascertain whether there is a genuine difference between sexes in terms of the aforementioned factors. Also, among female lung cancer patients, many are non-smokers, a finding that could be explored further to identify alternative carcinogenic mechanisms independent from smoking-related ones. In this paper, we reviewed germ-line genetic polymorphisms and somatic alterations in cancer tissues as host factors, especially those distributed differently between sexes, which may explain clinical differences in lung cancer between the sexes.
